
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


We hope all of you have made plans to join us in Chicago for COLOR -The Chicago Black Fine Art Exposition May 19 to May 21. The first show of its kind in the Windy City, it promises to be the most diverse show of black fine art ever in the Midwest. We are looking forward to seeing old

friends and making new ones. * Margaret Warfield has become the darling of Walt Disney World! Her painting 'Connections' was the official poster for Black Heritage Month and she was a feature artist at opening and closing ceremonies. We never know what direction Charly Palmer in going in next. We have a new series of jazz musicians and he painted several truly wonderful dancers. This are all quite different from the paintings you all loved so much when he was here last November. * James Denmark has been experimenting again. Take a look at the backgrounds on his latest pieces. He has been painting on glass plates and pressing them onto the paper. The technique adds a new dimension and depth to his mixed media pieces. And check out the new mask pieces he's done recently. * Katherine Kisa is going off in new directions. She's taken old records (remember those?) and painted over them in her inimitable style. * We don't know how Paul Goodnight even manages to catch up with himself. He recently completed "Sweet Cider Sounds Echoing From a Brownstone Chamber" to grace the cover of The Boys Choir of Harlem Official 30th Anniversary Magazine. This 30" x 40" mixed-media painting is pure layer on layer brilliance. And all you visitors to the Orlando Airport will be regaled with a fifty-foot mosaic of his. * Finally got more copper pieces from Buchi Upjohn. Seems like we sell them out as quickly as they of his early studies and sketches with his collectors. We have several early 80's pieces and are eagerly awaiting more. * Just heard a rumor that Howard University will be hosting 'Celebration and Vision: The Hewitt Collection of African-American Art' August 13 to October 14. The fifty -eight pieces in this collection (purchased by Bank of America in 1998) represent fifty years of John and Vivian Hewitt's (Continued Page 4, Column 1)



Some artists search for years to find their signature style. For Melvin it was just a matter of picking up a paint brush or a wood carving tool. Intense colors, radiating lines and a flow that harkens back to the jazz that inspires his work are the hallmarks of Melvin's work. A master of both cubism and expressionism; his unique style exhibits an unbridled cacophony of both passion and spirituality. One of the few contemporary artists that sublimely carves wood, his woodcuts are beautiful renditions when first pulled. And yet Melvin quite often hand embellishes them with oil to further his artistic statement. Melvin's lust for life and his enjoyment of people is evident in both his art and his smile. But the art world was almost deprived of Melvin's gifts. Coming of age in Detroit in the early sixtles, he was discouraged from choosing art as a career. Fortunately for us his natural talent could not be squeiched, and by the mid 1970's Melvin was starting to experiment with the style that is now his own. African-American mentors were rare during this period and he cites Diego Rivera's murais as being a major influence in his life. By the early 80's collectors and academia were starting to take notice. He was commissioned by Schlitz Brewing to create the 1981 Detroit Blues Festival poster which immediately led to other commissions. But it was his move to New York City in 1986, numerous gallery shows and a stint at the Printmakers Workshop that catapulted him to worldwide recognition and a place in the permanent collection of the Museum of Modern Art. Shows in Holland, Denmark, Sweden and France in the early 1990's brought his work to the attention of legions of collectors who continue to avidly seek (Continued Page 3, Column 2)

ARTY-FACTS

The Medium is the Message

No we aren't having a seance. The media of art is the material or technique an artist uses to produce a work of art. Here's a few of the most commonly used media:

 Acrylic - a synthetic paint that came into popular use in the 1940's. It has great versatility and quick drying time so it is a favorite among many artists.

 Bas Relief - A French term meaning "low raised work." It is a type of sculpture meant to be

viewed from only one side.

 Batik - A way of dying cloth using removable wax to repel the dye on areas of the cloth where it is not wanted. Originated in Indonesia, but has been produced in parts of Africa for centuries.

Collagraph - A print made from a low-relief

collage.

 Charcoal - Compressed burnt wood use for drawing.

• Engraving - An intaglio print made by cutting slices of metal out of a plate.


· Etching - An intaglio prints produced by using

acid to cut line into a metal plate.

 Gouache - A heavy, opaque watercolor paint producing a stronger color than regular watercolor. Also used to denote a painting made with this type of paint.

 Impasto - A thick application of paint or deep brushstrokes usually created with oil paint.

- Intaglio Collective term for several graphic processes in which prints are made from ink trapped in the grooves of an incised (usually metal) plate.
- Linoleum Cut (Linocut) A linoleum block or plate used for relief printing. It is cut much the same as a woodcut but the image is softer and without grain. Also refers to a print made by this method.
- Mixed-Media Painting Produced by combining two or more media. (More next issue!)
