Spotlight on CAL MASSEY

Cal's incredible energy belies the fact that he has been a professional artist for more than 40 years. His work transcends the four decades with timeless images of beautiful black women, African families, and his highly acclaimed "Genesis" series. The "Genesis" paintings interpret the first book of the Bible with vibrant colors and texture. Cal combines mastery of symmetry with his own blend of realism and mood to create paintings that float off the canvas and invoke an emotional response from the viewer. In addition to his painting, Cal is a

master engraver. He has designed rings for the Armed Forces, and created over 200 medallic designs for the Franklin Mint and others. His most recent were designed for the US Mint to commemorate the 1996 Olympics. In 1992, he designed the monument, "Patriots

of African Descent" for the Valley Forge Memorial Tribute. He also had the honor of being commissioned to design a bas relief sculpture for the Statue of Liberty Foundation. His illustrations have graced the pages of the Saturday Evening Post, Ebony magazine, and numerous books. Through all his acclaim and awards, Cal is one of the most down-to-earth people I have ever met. I believe this is why his work is so highly sought by both art lovers and serious collectors. Every time we see him, he has a new piece that beckons us to pay attention. It is easy to understand how he has become one of America's most loved and respected artists.

Protect Your Investment

Even if all your art is conservation framed (and we hope it is!), its smart to have it inspected by a professional framer at least every five years. An inspection includes:

- removing the dust cover
- inspecting the hinging of the artwork
- checking for acid migration, insect, mois

ture, and ultraviolet damage

If all is well, a new dust cover is put on. If not, a condition report is issued with recommendations on bringing it up to conservation standards. We charge \$25.00 for the first inspection piece and \$10.00 for each additional piece. A very small amount to protect your art.

ARTY - FACTS

"The Giclee Print"

Have you seen this latest printing technique? "Giclee" (ghee-clay) translates from the French as a 'spraying of ink.' The process is a marriage of computerized imaging, ink jet printing and fine art printmaking.

In the Giclee process the original image is scanned into a computer. Adjustments can be made for hue, value and density. A highly saturated water based ink is then sprayed in fine dots onto archival paper or canvas. An ultraviolet coating is then sprayed over the image.

The final prints have very high resolution and a dynamic color range. The color intensity is similar to a serigraph. That's the technical end - what about the esthetics?

I'm not one to be readily impressed by new technologies, but Giclees look good. The prints Kenny Gatewood has done are superior reproductions; capturing every nuance of his original watercolors. All the giclees we've seen have been strong translations of the original art. They have a much richer look than offset lithography. Most are done on watercolor paper to further the look of an original. Prices seem to be somewhat higher than offset, but less than serigraphs.

Giclees are definitely the new direction many publishers and artists are taking. As with all new printing methods, the ultimate success of the medium will be determined by art lovers and collectors. Take a look at a Giclee and tell us what you think.

Carved frames are back also. These have a much different look than traditional gold frames of years past. They have a new range of metallics and colors with more contemporary styling.



With so much to choose from - this might be the time to get that art out of the closet!


Hang Ups

"I'm all out of wall space" is a common complaint of art lovers. Like many of you, I started with one large framed piece over the sofa. That same wall got soon two more pieces and before long my collection took over not only my wall space; it began piling up (still unframed) under the bed, in the closet, everywhere! That's



when I began to learn creative wall arranging. I also discovered many spots around the house that were instantly warmed when I hung art in unexpected places. Before we get to specific wall groupings, let's answer the questions I hear most.

- ❖ Frames do not have to match. If the mats and frame look great on the art, chances are it will harmonize with many other pieces.
- ❖ The subject matter in a grouping can all be the same if you have collections of ladies, jazz, kids, etc. However, if you collect the way I do (whatever talks to me) you will need to use similar color, texture, or mediums to tie together your



arrangements.

- Frames do not all have to be the same size (boring!). Small pieces grouped to offset a larger piece work very well.
- Frames do not have to line up at either the top or bottom. We'll talk more next issue about the "centerline."
