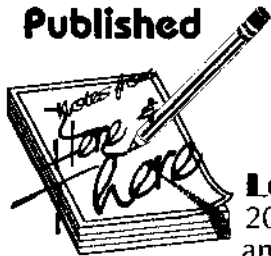

Dorothy Wright

Whenever we try to explain 'mixed-media' to our clients we show them a Dorothy Wright creation. Every one of her paintings is a mixed-media, multidimensional construction. Dorothy's most amazing skill is her seamless combination of three-dimensional objects and fabrics with painted imagery. If you haven't yet seen a Dorothy Wright painting, there is no easy way to describe a work that beckons you to reach out and touch it. Once you have seen one, you will never forget her style. A Southern lady who celebrated both her 71st birthday (sorry Dorothy, I told) and 50th Anniversary in the year 2000; her subject matter reflects the story of her life mixed with her vision of beauty. Growing up in South Carolina, Dorothy's early life was not the pretty pictures she paints. But her spirit and talent transcend the hardships and focus only on the beauty she remembers. Lush flowers, colorful clothing, and perfect multimedia details suffuse her work with incredible warmth. A High School valedictorian, Dorothy graduated summa cum laude from Chafin College and immediately embarked on the career that would be her life for the next 32 years, teaching art in South Carolina public schools. She was elected Teacher of the Year, C.A. Brown High School three times; 1972, 1981 and 1982. Many of her students have gone on to professional arts careers. A fortuitous meeting with the great educator Septima Clark in 1949 proved to be a blessing for Dorothy as she was later commissioned to paint a portrait

Now that we have talked
about various mediums - it's time to discuss the big C
word - **COLLECTING!** I know of no other term in the
ethnic art world that draws such mixed emotions. Do you
consider yourself an art lover, connoisseur, collector; or all
or none of the above? I think anyone reading this
acknowledges their love of art. So why are some of us
collectors and others are not? Does it have to do with
passion, the size of one's bank account or other much
more esoteric considerations? One of our clients said he
became a collector the day he bought a painting that cost
more than five thousand dollars. Yet another client calls
herself a collector and she has never paid more than five
hundred dollars for any piece. So what are the common
traits of all collectors regardless of price considerations?

- ❖ Art is both a passion and an avocation for a collector. For many collectors it is their main hobby.
- ❖ Collectors travel to wherever the art and artists can be found.
- ❖ Collectors concentrate on acquiring originals and original hand-pulled graphics. Giclees and limited edition offset prints are not where we tend to spend our money.
- ❖ Collectors place the acquisition of art on the same level of importance as buying a luxury car or taking a cruise.
- ❖ Even though few of us would ever consider selling the art we have collected, collectors appreciate the growth in value of their pieces.
- ❖ Collectors continue to buy after every inch of wall space is filled.
- ❖ Collectors of even modest means find a way to buy original art.

Hang Ups

Maybe this issue's Hang Ups should be called Sit Ups. No, not the exercise kind. Sculpture, ceramics and wood carvings have become such hot sellers around here, I think we should talk about arranging them. 3-dimensional objects open a whole new world of decorating possibilities and challenges. Mantels, tables, shelves, floors and wall niches come to life. Where to set objects depends on both the object and your lifestyle. Some objects demand floor space, others project from walls. Practicality must rule placement.

I'm a firm believer that 3 dimensional pieces will tell you where they need to be placed if you just live with them for a few days and see how the relationship develops.

Let's answer a few basic questions:

- How massive and heavy is the object?
- How tactile is the object? Is it a piece that you are going to want to touch? What kind of relationship to you want with this particular object?
- Do you want to view the object from all sides? Most Sculpture and carvings are detailed on all sides, but some ceramics (Andreas Goff's work for example) have a definite front and back.
- Is the object breakable? Do you have young children or a cat? A clumsy husband?
- Is there a shelf or nook in your house crying out for a splash of shape or color?
- Is the detail of the piece stronger at the top, bottom or sides? As with paintings, the answer to this helps us decide how high to place the object.
- Do you have a way to light the object?

Answer the above questions and you will be well on the way to living with any type of sculpture or three-dimensional object. In the spring issue we'll tackle do's and don'ts, proper lighting, pedestals and caring for dimensional objects. Call or e-mail us with any questions or comments. 

of Clark, for the Septima Clark Child Development Center in 1978. Nearly twenty years later she was commissioned by the City of Charleston to paint an oil portrait of Clark which proudly hangs in City Hall. Dorothy's time as a civil rights activist in the sixties and seventies added personal poignancy to the portrait of Denmark Vesey she was commissioned to paint in 1976. The Vesey portrait, one of her first commissions, has also been used as an illustration for children's books. Dorothy's accomplishments during her teaching years are amazing. In addition to raising four children; she served on the State Committee of the Scholastic Arts Awards, the Art Collection Committee for the Charleston Aviation Authority (Charleston International Airport), the acquisition committee of the South Carolina Arts Commission, won a PUSH Outstanding Achievement in Education award, and served on numerous other boards. And she hasn't slowed down a bit since retiring from full time teaching. She's always on the outlook for the 'found' materials she incorporates into her paintings, she looks after her young granddaughter, lends a hand for charity events and paints in her spare moments.

Perhaps the true greatness of an artist is measured by how many lives they touch, how many generations they inspire. Dorothy has done that her entire life and her paintings will continue to enrich are lives forever.
